

Dear parents and members of our College community,

Congratulations to our wonderful, wonderful Wakkakirri team from Jamieson Way. You performed magnificently on one of the most prestigious stages in Melbourne – Hamer Hall. What an honour, how exciting and also nerve wracking. We were all so proud of your high quality historical performance in the State Final Awards night. The feedback I have received from our College staff who worked behind the scenes with you was extremely positive – you upheld our College values well.

Over the holidays both College ovals will be top dressed and fertilised in order to prepare them well for the wear and tear of the upcoming summer season. We anticipate that the majority of this work will take place in the holiday period. We are very close to finalising the engagement of contractors to supply and install soccer, rugby and Australian rules goal posts on both ovals. Every day counts: Remember we want all our students to be a HERO. (Here Everyday Ready On-time)

Did you know?

- Patterns of late arrival at school or missing classes are early warning signs.
- Missing one day of school each week adds up to 2 months missed over a year.
- Each day of school absence has an impact on skill development and social connections.
- Poor attendance may be associated with future unemployment, and poorer health in the future.

What you can do

- Act early.
- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day, make that the expectation. Regular attendance at school sets up good behaviours for regular attendance at work.
- Help your child maintain daily routines such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep. On average, children need 8-9 hours sleep to be healthy and alert. You may also need to monitor their use of the Internet, mobile phone, hand-held gaming devices and TV at night to ensure they are not staying up too late or being disturbed while sleeping.
- Try not to schedule hair, dental or medical appointments during school hours. Arrange family holidays during scheduled school holidays so that they don't miss out on classes and feel left behind.
- Monitor your child's attendance on Compass and attend Student Learning Conferences to monitor their learning.
- Students are welcome to attend Breakfast Club at Carranballac on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 8am. Students can enjoy a bowl of cereal, a warm milo or some toast with friends before 8:30am.

A reminder that our term finishes at 2pm this Friday. Thank you to our incredible parents who have supported us so strongly over the term in so many different ways. We look forward to working with you again in Term 4. We wish our families a restful break and trust that all our students will return safely on Monday 9 October ready to work hard in Term 4.

Kids Teaching Kids Conference

On Wednesday 6th of September the Carranballac P-9 College Student Environment Leaders hosted the 6th Annual Western Metro Region Kids Teaching Kids Conference. It was an absolutely amazing event involving more than 100 Carranballac students, as well as students from local surrounding schools. We were lucky enough to have the conference attended and opened by Aaron Wood, Deputy Mayor of Melbourne and Director of Kids Teaching Kids.

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Our students, and those from other schools, presented a various number of engaging workshops regarding a variety of environmental issues such as the health of our local Cheetham Wetlands. Students shared the ways they have been investigating the health of our Cheetham Creek wetlands, and demonstrated how to conduct water tests such as pH, electrical conductivity, salinity, reactive phosphorus and turbidity. Students taught about how to establish if your local waterways are in the right condition to provide a healthy home for its inhabitants. The group will be presenting this workshop again next month at the Melbourne Water Conference and are excited to have a chance to share this information with others across the region.

On the 7th September, the 'Love Your Locals' day workshop was conducted at the Werribee Open Range Zoo where students from 10 Wyndham schools participated in activities and workshops dedicated to saving local wildlife and sharing ideas on how to create a smarter and greener Wyndham, as well as saving local endangered species such as the Eastern Barred Bandicoot.

Our 'Extinction Fighters' made us proud once again with their amazing presentation, and also got the opportunity to take part in an adventure around the Werribee Open Range Zoo. They met the critically endangered Eastern Barred Bandicoot, explored the Habitat Haven and the native grasslands and attended an anti littering workshop. We also got the proud opportunity to name our baby bandicoot 'Bila' (meaning river) which we named in relation to the rivers and other wetlands around our Point Cook and Wyndham areas. Our Year 3/4 Environment Leader's students made us very proud indeed. Well Done!

Carranballac College thanks Holcim Werribee for their generous funding towards the cost of our environmental science programs.

Congratulations also goes to Carranballac P-9 College students who have been announced as winners of the Love Your Locals, Keep Wyndham Clean Poster Competition! Check that Itch!

It has come to our attention that some students in the school may have head lice and we seek your cooperation in checking your child's hair this week.

If head lice or eggs are found on your child's hair you need to inform The College and advise when the treatment has started. You may wish to advise parents or carers of your child's friends so they too have the opportunity to detect and treat their children if necessary.

It has come to our attention that some students in the school may have head lice and we seek your cooperation in checking your child's hair this week.

Head lice do not transmit infectious diseases – they are transmitted by having head to head contact with someone who has head lice. You may be reassured to know that head lice are commonly found in places other than in schools.

What can you do?

We seek your cooperation in checking your child's hair and in those instances where head lice or eggs are found, treating your child's hair.

Please see the information at <http://www.health.vic.gov.au/headlice/> to help with the detection and treatment of head lice.

If head lice or eggs are found on your child's hair you need to inform The College and advise when the treatment has started. You may wish to advise parents or carers of your child's friends so they too have the opportunity to detect and treat their children if necessary.



When can my child return to school? Health regulations requires that where a child has head lice, that child should not return to school until the day after appropriate treatment has started. Please note, this refers only to those children who have live head lice and does not refer to head lice eggs.

Carranballac P-9 College is aware that head lice can be a sensitive issue and is committed to maintaining your confidentiality.
