Director's Report—Brendan O'Brien

Dear parents and Carranballac families,

Welcome back to everyone for Term Three. *I would like to start by thanking all of our families for their support with our Curriculum Day on Monday*. All staff benefitted greatly from their Inquiry Learning studies, capably led by Lesley Hall and the College coaching staff. One of our College priorities; over the next period of the Strategic Plan, is to strengthen the consistency of the 'across campus curriculum planning and pedagogy'. Curriculum days provide us with the valuable opportunity to have all staff working together in the planning and learning process to achieve this goal. On Monday our ES staff; from across the College, spent time building their knowledge alongside teachers and also under the guidance of our Well Being leader – Chris Billings. This is just another way these professional learning days can build consistency and improve learning opportunities for staff and students. Staff are to be commended for the professional manner in which they engaged in their learning and planning for our students. Special thanks goes to Lesley and Chris for leading the sessions and to the coaching staff for their expert assistance.

Facilities: The challenge in such a large College; with two campuses, is to ensure we have ever improving facilities to match the needs of the student population. In order to address this challenge School Council has formed a Facilities sub committee made up of two parent representatives and three College staff: Ian Muir (chairperson and Council member), Liz Whiffen (Council member), Jim Hoile (College facilities manager), John Forrester (Sustainability Co ordinator) and myself.

The committee has a number of projects and approaches currently under consideration – all aimed at improving College facilities. We will provide details of each project as they progress to the action stage in each case.

Our first action is to introduce a trial partnership with **Corrections Victoria** and have a **supervised work team** on site on alternate Sundays. The first week will be at the Boardwalk School (this coming Sunday), the second at Jamieson Way and so on. The work team will undertake various grounds and gardening tasks as directed by the College and under the supervision of the appointed supervisor.

Our second action has been to finalise the implementation of an energy efficiency project which will improve the lighting in both halls and save the College considerable money over time. All gym lighting at both Schools will be replaced in the next few months. The funding for this project came from the Victorian Government through the Resource SMART project. Thankyou John for your successful application.

Another thought to reflect on at home and work:

If we add 'parent' or even 'adult' into the quotation, then we immediately grow the partnership of empowering student learning, especially if we are all on the same supportive pathway. The partner ship that we strive for with families has strong links through the four <u>Student Learning Conferences</u> we conduct every year. Please take note that **Student Learning Conferences are on next week. Your attendance is essential.**

I look forward to catching up with more families over the course of the next few weeks.

Return of Forms and Payments

Parents and Guardians are reminded that ALL forms are required to be returned promptly and completed in FULL. This is particularly important in regard to medical issues your child has or has experienced in the past as some of the destinations we visit for programs do not have hospitals or medical centres as close as we experience here in Point Cook. When we are aware of any potential issues in advance we can put measures in place to assure you and your child has the support available should it be required.

I am often asked if no special dietary or medical issues need to be reported does a form still have to be returned and my answer is always YES. We are required by law to have forms, medical and permission with dates, returned for all attending students and to keep these for 7 years. If forms are not returned on time, students are unable to attend.

All payments are required to be received by the dates provided on the forms for students to be included in programs. No late payments can be accepted as we have a number of organisations to inform and coordinate with their own deadlines to adhere to. If you require a payment plan to be organised to allow your child to attend a program, other than the one provided to you, please do not hesitate to seek this prior to the closing date.

Your assistance in helping us to adhere to these deadlines is greatly appreciated.



Financial Assistance

Information for Parents

Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities. If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.

You should lodge a CSEF application form at the school by 26 June 2015.

Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF)

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school of the eligible applicants.

Some common examples of school-organised programs for which the CSEF payment may be used include:

School camps/trips

Swimming and other school-organised sporting programs

Outdoor education programs

Excursions/incursions

To apply please collect an application form from the office or download from www.education.vic.gov.au/csef. Completed forms should be submitted, along with a copy of the Centrelink concession card, to the office.

Criteria 1 - Eligibility

To be eligible for the fund, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or non-government Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- on the first day of Term two, or;
- on the first day of Term three;
- Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, OR
- 2. Be a temporary foster parent, and;
- 3. Submit an application to the school by the due date.

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above

Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and 17 years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between 5 and 18 years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

Eligibility Date

CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term two (13 April 2015) or term three (13 July 2015).

Payment amounts

CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an **annual payment** to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
 Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

About the 2015 Reading Challenge

Who is eligible? All Victorian Students in Foundation to Year 10.

Why? The Challenge aims to promote a love of reading. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student.

When? The 2015 challenge started during Term 1 2015 and will officially end on the 14 September 2015.

How? Students in Foundation to Year 2 are challenged to read or 'experience' 30 books and students in Years 3 to 9 are challenged to read 15 books by 14 September 2015 . If children are learning to read you can help them to experience books by reading to / or with them and talking about the text, story and pictures.

Getting started. Complete the consent form on the reverse of this page. Hand in the consent form to Library Staff. You will receive a record sheet to list books read. You are ready to begin.

Definitions: Department refers to the Victorian Department of Education and Training, Person refers to the child/adult listed below in the consent declaration.

Privacy Protection

The Department takes its privacy obligations seriously and any personal information collected or used by the Department will be handled in accordance with the *Privacy and Data Protection Act 2014* (Vic). This law sets out what we must do when the Department collects, uses, handles and destroys personal information.
